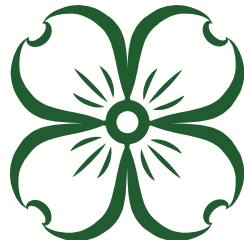

Three Year Results of HBNA's 28 License Plate Reader Cameras

HBNA's 28 Flock license plate reader cameras at all 14 entrances are protecting **ALL** HBNA residents better than expected. An in-depth study of 36 months since the January 2021 installation shows declining vehicle threats entering our neighborhood. Also, the cameras have operated superbly, currently working at 100%.

Here are 3 examples of criminal "alerts" of inbound vehicles

Inbound Alerts 2021

Stolen Plates: **151**
Stolen Vehicles: **34**
Sex Offenders: **8**

Inbound Alerts 2022

Stolen Plates: **44**
Stolen Vehicles: **8**
Sex Offenders: **3**

Inbound Alerts 2023

Stolen Plates: **38**
Stolen Vehicles: **13**
Sex Offenders: **2**

Additionally, more police officers from both Brookhaven and Atlanta receive "instant notification alerts" to their patrol cars. Alerts are automatically sent within 15 seconds to the closest patrol car near the alert location.

Nationally, 83% of property crime goes unsolved due to a lack of actionable evidence. 70% of these crimes occur with a vehicle. Our cameras not only read license plates but also capture a vehicle's make, model, and color. They are also vital in solving police investigations.

These Flock cameras are **NOT** paid by Brookhaven Security Association's (BSA) \$425 annual dues, which pays for off-duty police patrols and vacation checks. They are paid by HBNA's \$200 annual dues, and roughly half the \$200 is budgeted towards our Flock system. They are HBNA's largest expense and these expenses have not increased in the 3 years since installation. We have budgeted for increases in these costs for 2024.

We **all** receive protection from Flock cameras so we should **all** contribute to this benefit. Otherwise, HBNA will either start limiting other services, including the cameras, or HBNA dues will increase significantly. Boosting the participation rate of dues payment will prevent both. Currently, we are at **69%** participation rate of households. If you have not joined HBNA with your \$200 dues, we need you to do so ASAP. It's a small price to add valuable protection for your family and your property.

Trailblazing Scouting in the Historic Brookhaven Area

Many may not be aware that in 2019 the Boy Scouts of America expanded their program to allow for the formation of all girl troops. Local Scoutmaster John Embleton for the boy's troop 379 at St. Martin's Church was just wrapping up his scouting career after his son Jack completed the requirements for Eagle Scout when this announcement was made. However, his daughter Zoe age 14 at the time heard the news and decided that she wanted to be among the first women in the United States to earn the rank of Eagle Scout.

John and some other leaders from the boy's troop started Scouts BSA Troop 160 at St. Martin's with twelve young women. They worked on the exact same programs that their male counterparts were working on with camping, attending meetings to earn merit badges along with several service projects out in our community. During the impact of the covid years, the troop decided to combine with local Troop 372 at St. James Church to keep the quality of the program for the women in place. Leslie Evans is the Scoutmaster for that troop, and the combined troop currently has close to thirty women scouts as members. The troop has awarded the rank of Eagle Scout to approximately fifteen young women so far. John's daughter Zoe was the latest to earn the rank after completing her Eagle project and her Eagle Board of Review.

Troop 372 was founded on February 1, 2019, the first day that troops for girls could exist. They are proud to be a part of the scouting movement of the Boy Scouts of America. They are non-denominational and welcome all girls ages 11 to 18 to Scouting. Scouts do not need any prior experience to join the troop, so whether you were a Webelo or you just want to hop in now you're all welcome! The chartered organization, St. James United Methodist Church, and the brother troop, Troop 370 work side-by-side to provide a quality scouting program that has five main goals for the girls:

- *To grow in moral strength and character*
- *To actively participate in citizenship*
- *To develop physical, emotional, and spiritual fitness*
- *To be comfortable in the outdoors and appreciate outdoor activities*
- *To develop leadership skills*

The troop strives to make your daughter the best person she can be and to give her the fundamental tools to be successful in whatever path she chooses in life. These skills are learned by Scouts working together and doing things themselves. As the parent of a Scout, you can expect to share these rich experiences with your daughter as she becomes more confident and knowledgeable by living the Scout Oath and Law.

A Conversation with Madeleine Simmons Regarding City of Brookhaven

You ran for Council unopposed this year, which is great. But if you'd had opposition, what points about your goals and aspirations for COB would you have told the voters about?

I truly love serving our community. We have been busy over the past four years, improving and expanding parks and greenspace (including Brookhaven Park ownership, finally!), supporting our police department through the expansion of the mental health and crisis intervention department and innovative drone program, working with our small businesses during Covid to find creative ways to keep their doors open safely, re-paving tired streets, encouraging connectivity with new sidewalks, beautifying neighborhoods and everything in between! Brookhaven is a wonderful place to live because we have high standards for our City and community. Over these next four years I will continue to prioritize the importance of maintaining the high level of services our neighbors have grown to expect. I will also continue to look for ways we can improve our quality of life in Brookhaven, through solutions on traffic, storm-water, and other day-to-day issues that overall impact our community.

What do you see as important for the next 5 years for Brookhaven? Can you envision further out?

Continuing the conversation on connectivity I believe will be a benefit to our neighbors. The multi-use path on Ashford Dunwoody will soon be complete from Johnson Ferry to Peachtree Road, to North Druid Hills, to Briarwood and down to the Peachtree Creek Greenway. We have wonderful businesses and restaurants in Town Brookhaven, Dresden Village, Porter Square and the Dresden Entertainment district, but currently, it is difficult to get to them for pedestrians, bikers, walkers and those not in a car. CHOA will soon break ground on the pedestrian bridge that will go over Interstate 85 and depending on its success, perhaps that is something we can look at building across Peachtree Road, to better connect the Dresden area with the businesses and neighborhoods across Peachtree Road.

Can you tell us what's going to be in the new City Center and what won't? Will it be similar to Sandy Spring's where they have event space?

Yes, in part of the city centre planning, there was extensive community engagement through pop-ups around town, meetings, surveys and social media. It was very clear that Brookhaven residents were interested in an indoor/outdoor community space where people could gather and attend events like movies on the green, artist/farmers markets, live music and cocktails and everyday activities like meetups at the coffee shop, which will be inside the building. Roughly 60% of the space will be for the community. Additionally, city administration offices and city council meetings will be there. There have been rumors that the Dekalb Library on N. Druid Hills will be moved to that space but is not accurate. Dekalb County owns the library and has plans to re-build it at its current location.

Traffic is a major concern for our residents. What do the Mayor and City Council plan to do to rectify the congestion on Peachtree/N. Druid Hills and Dresden? Any plan to improve the Duncan Donuts exit on Brookhaven Drive?

We have already been discussing with GDOT and our Traffic Department ways to improve this intersection. Changing the traffic light timing and “don’t block the box” striping are just two of the options being considered. They are still considering the matter and we can expect some improvements in the near future. Also, I am keenly aware of the cut-through traffic our neighbors experience. I am committed to exploring creative solutions to help lighten and/or remedy the increased cut-through traffic in our neighborhoods.

Can you give us an update on the City’s plan to improve the Peachtree Road corridor. What’s the timeline on that?

There was a Peachtree LCI improvement plan approved several years ago but it was never funded. I don’t think we’ll see the total re-vamp of the Peachtree corridor that the plan called for. What I anticipate seeing is an improvement at the Peachtree and Osborne intersection after the re-do of Brookhaven Park is completed and funding becomes available. We’ll have a beautiful new park but congestion to get into it and out of it. Re-doing that intersection should help considerably.

Now that St. Martin’s has backed out of the Morrison Farms land, we’ve heard multiple different things that the city intends for the property. Can you tell us what is planned?

The City purchased the land in early 2024 as part of our initiative to preserve and expand our City’s green space. Thank you to Mayor Park and my fellow councilmembers for supporting me in purchasing it! There have apparently been rumors that it might be sold for housing development but those rumors are false. Initially, it will be cleaned up and maintained for the neighbors to enjoy, as one of the City of Brookhaven’s goals is to have a park within a 10-minute walk of all residents. Down the line, if and when funding becomes available, community engagement will begin to see if there is an appetite to program it into a more formal park space.

Brookhaven Park is still under construction. Is it on schedule?

I am ecstatic that the Brookhaven Park improvements are well on their way!! It is a year long construction schedule that broke ground at the end of summer, 2023, and we anticipate will be completed on time, by end of summer/early fall, 2024. In addition to the new bathrooms, pavilions, paths and totally remodeled and expanded playground, a new community garden space is being installed. It will be for all types of gardeners (old, young, experienced and inexperienced!) and people interested in getting involved should contact me at madeleine.simmons@brookhavenga.gov For dog lovers, Skyland Park off Dresden has been remodeled and it has a dog park available with partitioned areas for small and large dogs.
